OBITUARY

Franklin A. Holman was born to the late Vivian and Baxter D. Holman, Sr. on November 14, 1941. He departed this life on Tuesday, July 18, 2017.

Life of Service

On any given day, one could hear Franklin reminiscing of his fondest memories of his life as an honorably discharged member of the United States Army. He would often speak of his military buddies such as Wallace Stone and others. After his discharge, Franklin went on to work at Salem Steel. Ultimately he fulfilled what would be his 30 year 'career dream' as a one of the first African American Policemen with the Winston -Salem Police Department. Franklin developed a sincere love for the people of Winston-Salem and earned great respect from his peers, friends and staff as well as those within the community. He was diligent to share insight and knowledge with anyone that had a desire to learn. He would always say, "If I can help somebody as I pass along then my living shall not be in vain". Upon his retirement from WSPD, Captain Holman moved into another fulfilling position with the United States Marshall, where he remained until his retirement in 2013.

Passion for Education and Proponent of Teamwork

Mr. Holman believed that the greatest destroyer of ignorance is education. Mr. Holman discovered his love for math and French during his high school years. He could solve word problems and challenging equations at lightning speed and was always willing to challenge anyone to his 'selfmade' math quizzes and equations. His greatest lessons of life were sometimes learned on the football field. He would always say 'If you can't follow the directions of a leader, then you will never become a leader. Leaders follow first'. Mr. Holman moved on to higher Education at Winston-Salem State University. After completing his studies and joining the Winston-Salem Police Department, Mr. Holman continued to strive for excellence. His greatest accomplishment was the invitation received to complete training with the Federal Bureau of Investigation in Quantico, Virginia. Upon completion, Franklin took his training to heart and began to mentor other patrolmen/officers and ultimately he was able to see many of his protégés' surpass him in the ranks during their career.
