Matthew 5:6 "Blessed are those who hunger and thirst for righteousness, for they shall be satisfied.

This beatitude may be difficult for us to appreciate. If we miss lunch, we might say, "I'm so hungry, I could eat a horse." We search the kitchen cabinets and pantry then pathetically declare, "There's nothing to eat!" In most cases, food is available but none that we desire to eat or take the time to cook. However, in the days of Jesus, those who hunger, and thirst were in dire need. Death was imminent unless their need for food and water were met. Few of us have experienced this type of hunger and thirst, the painful craving of the body for food and water, leading to an overwhelming and all-consuming desire to eat and drink to sustain life.

With this imagery, the fourth beatitude teaches that the believer who intensely desire for righteousness, as if all of life depended on it, is blessed by God. The word "righteousness" includes "justice." In this case, the fourth beatitude takes the form of a prayer where God's people cry out to God for him to intervene in this sin-torn world and to deliver his people from all sufferings and injustices. Considering all the calamities reported recently in the news, does your heart long for when the Lord Jesus returns and declares, "Behold, I am making all things news"? The final prayer of the Bible should always be in our hearts and minds, "Come, Lord Jesus" (Rev. 22:20). The promise of the return of Jesus is a constant and faithful source of hope for every believer, even in the darkest days.

In addition, the word "righteousness" refers to right conduct before Holy God. In this case, the fourth beatitude takes the form of a strong conviction and strength. It reflects the spiritual yearning and continual desire for doing what is right in God's sight. Of course, every believer continues to struggle with the sin nature, but still, there should be an underlying determination in every believer to obey God and to honor Him in all things. Do you have a strong desire to grow in spiritual maturity? Is that desire reflected clearly in how you live?

This beatitude contains a beautiful promise, total satisfaction, which only comes from God. It is his blessing to those who hunger and thirst for righteousness. The blessing is finding that God is always more than sufficient every spiritual need. This is important because living righteously before God and seeking righteousness in this sin-torn world cannot be self-willed. It only comes by looking upwards. Just as a small baby will hunger and thirst but is incapable of satisfying those longings, a believer can never satisfy his hunger and thirst for righteousness. Only a gracious God who has the power to transform the mind, heart, character, and behavior of his people can provide true satisfaction. The holy life described by Jesus in the Sermon on the Mount is never the product of human effort but is only the product of the transforming grace of God. Ultimately, this total satisfaction is experienced in eternity when we are finally freed from the curse of sin and can fully enjoy the beauty of the Lord Jesus without restriction and limitation.

A question was posed to Rev. Billy Graham

I'm from another country and am visiting some of my relatives here who are in graduate school. I asked them what your festival on July 4 means, but they were not sure. Does it have something to do with your Christian religion?

A:

July 4th commemorates the day in 1776 that our nation declared itself to be an independent nation, and no longer a colony of England. On that date, a number of our leading citizens signed what is known as the Declaration of Independence, stating our determination to become a free country.

Our independence did not come easily; only after several difficult years of war would it finally be won. Nor were our first years as a nation free from problems and controversies (as is still true). But our forefathers were determined to establish a free and democratic system of government, and the Declaration of Independence (together with our Constitution and the Bill of Rights) became the foundation for this. They have stood the test of time, and on July 4th we give thanks for the wisdom and faith and courage of those leaders.

Although it is not a religious holiday like Christmas or Easter, for many Americans July 4th is a time to reflect on God's goodness to us as a nation. Molded into the Liberty Bell in Philadelphia (which proclaimed our independence) are these words from the Bible: "Proclaim liberty throughout all the land unto all the inhabitants thereof" (Leviticus 25:10, KJV). Our legal system reflects our Judeo-Christian roots.

While we look with gratitude to the past on this July 4th, may we also look in faith to the future, and commit it and our lives to God and His will. The ancient words of the Psalmist are still true: "Blessed is the nation whose God is the Lord" (Psalm 33:12).

I am sure you have heard this bit of information, but I would like to mention it again.


