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#### Matthew 5:8 "Blessed are the pure in heart, for they shall see God."

The Beatitudes describe the character of true believers, those who will enter the Kingdom of God. These characteristics show us how the Gospel transforms the sinner. In the sixth beatitude, the Lord Jesus announces a divine blessing on those who are pure in heart. What does this mean?

Jesus is likely referring to Psalm 24 where King David declares that to worship the Lord and to stand confidently in his holy presence, the believer must have "clean hands and a pure heart." In addition, the believer must not lift his or her soul up to falsehood and deceit (Ps. 24:2). For our worship to have any value and significance, it must reflect a personal integrity. We cannot go through the motions when it comes to worshipping the Lord. We cannot live to satisfy our sinful urges and still expect God to be pleased with our songs of worship and statements of devotion. The Lord rejects all external forms of worship that does not arise from a deep love for him. In fact, in Isaiah 1:10-20, the Lord hates outward practices of worship that do not foster true piety among his people. To use a common expression, the Lord is not looking for believers who merely talk the talk, he requires believers to walk the walk.

In Jesus' ministry, his strongest and most direct rebukes are aimed at the religious leaders. Outwardly, they were involved in all sorts of religious activities, yet Jesus was fully aware that they were hypocrites. He claimed that unless your righteousness exceeded that of the scribes and Pharisees, you will never enter the Kingdom of heaven (Matthew 5:20). This means that our standing before God can never been judged solely about the amount of religious works we have done. We must look for a righteousness that is beyond our own ability to obtain.

To be pure at heart means to live honestly before God and before people. It is the opposite of being a hypocrite. However, there is a major problem. No one is naturally pure in heart. We are naturally selfish. Left on our own, we reject God's authority. We are sinners. Jeremiah 17:9 describes the human heart as "deceitful above all things, desperately sick." But thankfully, there is hope in the Gospel of Jesus Christ. In 1 Peter 1:22, Peter describes conversion as "having purified your soul by your obedience to the truth" and because of this, as Christians, we are able to "love one another earnestly from a pure heart."

What is the promise for the pure in heart? The Lord Jesus tells us, "They will see God." This is a beautiful promise. Those who have experienced the purifying power of the Gospel have the assurance that we will be able enter God's presence and behold Him in all His glory and power. With this in mind, we ought to make it a daily prayer, "Create in me a clean heart, O God, and renew a right spirit within me."
