John 1:14, "The Word became flesh and dwelt among us, and we have seen his glory, glory as of the only Son from the Father, full of grace and truth."

As Christmas approaches, we are encouraged once again to remember the reason for the season. Unfortunately, even if we manage to avoid the materialism and commercialism of the cultural celebration of Christmas, many believers are still unaware of the central significance of the holiday. When thinking about the significance of Christmas, many believers think first of the virgin birth. Church cantatas or programs often focus primarily on the virgin birth. Historically, Fundamentalism, a movement within Christianity during the late 19th and early 20th centuries, raised belief in the virgin birth to one of the five fundamentals of the Christian faith; meaning that if a person rejected the virgin birth, they were rejecting Christianity all-together. Looking back, it is easy to see why Fundamentalists took a strong stance on the virgin birth. Fundamentalism was a response to the rise of theological liberalism. In academic circles where higher criticism of the Bible was embraced, there was a growing opposition against the inspiration of Scripture. One of the first areas of biblical conviction that was dismissed was belief in the virgin birth.

Yet, at the same time, it is surprising how little the NT teaches about the virgin birth. Only the birth narratives of Matthew and Luke mention it and Luke does not give much attention to it. There may be a few places that allude to the virgin birth, such as Galatians 4:4, but there is no direct reference to the virgin birth beyond the two birth narratives. As the doctrine of Christology is developed in the NT, there are more theologically significant teachings regarding the Lord Jesus Christ than his virgin birth. Belief in the virgin birth is important since Scripture teaches it, if only in two places. If a person rejects a clear teaching of Scripture in one place, it will logically lead him or her to question the rest of Scripture. So, it can be said that belief in the virgin birth is more of a reflection of a person's conviction concerning the inspiration of Scripture than it is necessarily a reflection of a person's understanding of the doctrine of Christology.

Why is this important? When celebrating Christmas, if we stop at the virgin birth, our celebration is incomplete and we have failed to remember the true meaning of Christmas. Truly celebrating Christmas is beholding the beauty of the incarnation; that the eternal Son of God became human. In our right desire to honor the Lord Jesus, sometimes we focus solely on his deity that we fail to appreciate his humanity. But because the Lord Jesus temporarily set aside the glories of heaven to become a man (Phil. 2:7), he now acts as the one and only mediator between God and men (1 Tim. 2:5). In his humanity, Jesus experienced afflictions and adversity. He was aware of poverty, hunger and tiredness. He suffered betrayal, loneliness and temptations. And so, we have a Savior who can sympathize with our weaknesses (Heb. 4:15). At Christmas, we celebrate that Jesus was made like us in every may so that he could act as our merciful and faithful high priest, making propitiation for our sins (Heb. 2:17). The virgin birth is important as the manner or method in which the Heavenly Father sent his Son into the world, but the incarnation, that Jesus is fully God and Man, is essential to all that it means to be Christian. To deny the incarnation is to deny Christianity. I pray that the Heavenly Father will open our eyes this Christmas to see the full beauty of Jesus Christ and to appreciate more fully the incarnation. I pray that we will live according to the stunning example of humanity that the incarnation provides.
