

Bill's original music was a universal blend of quality music compositions that touched the foundation of various styles of music which is brilliantly showcased in his magnum opus "Last Days" an album in which the title track received regional radio play. Beyond his professional music career Bill was also an educator and craftsman who specialized in traditional African ancestral wares. His objective in life was to spread harmony throughout the world by teaching and recording music as a communicative factor.

Bill was a loving father who enjoyed studying many topics which included: musical theory, philosophy, religion, and politics. He en-joyed and respected all aspects of nature. Above all, the one thing he loved more than music was his family. His family was his true pride and joy.
