

Charismatic Leaders by Dr. Jennifer Miller

In most summaries of leaders and leadership, a version of the word charisma tends to be mentioned. By definition charisma is "a personal magic of leadership arousing special popular loyalty or enthusiasm

for a public figure (such as a political leader)" but also "a special magnetic charm or appeal" or so Merriam-Webster dictionary contains. Other popular words for charisma are mesmerizing, mystical, alluring, attractive, and the list goes on because you get the idea charisma is the cat's meow. In the following, I will borrow a nod in one definition to share historical leaders I found charismatic, then reveal some strengths and drawbacks to charismatic leadership, and wrap up with my thoughts on it from experiences.

First up are the historical leaders I consider charismatic leaders. Abraham Lincoln, John F. Kennedy, and Barack Obama are three presidents and historical leaders I consider charismatic leaders of the past and present. Though possessing a negative charismatic result, Adolf Hitler is another historical leader that embraced charismatic qualities to convert others in a phenomenological manner (Yukl, George, & Jones, 2009). Each of the recognized leaders served a growing audience of voters and followers through their political careers, demonstrative of the charismatic capabilities each possessed and leveraged. Diverting from the political list, Beyonce Knowles is another leader of the recent and present entertainment industry. Mentioned in Shamir's (1995) work with minimal emphasis, charismatic attributes included physical appearance and Beyonce's presence on stage, in film, and among fans arguably facilitates her admiration across genders and generations to earn accolades and record-breaking successes among the categories of entertainment. A better known and unique star with charismatic leadership is Michael Jackson. Finally, I believe Major General Alfred K. Flowers is a charismatic leader as the Defense Department's longest serving Airman and African American (Ruane, 2011). As a mentee, I engaged with him on occasion and always enjoyed the awe-inspiring stories others would share of his tours and work with him. His knowledge, self-less work, and demeanor captured audiences.

Next up are the strengths and drawbacks of charismatic leadership. Strengths of charismatic leadership include a devoted followership with an unusual allegiance offset by the potential for a charismatic leader to direct the power for evil as in the case for Hitler's genocide effort (Yukl et al., 2009). Other strengths include the support charismatic leaders derive for transformational change as the charismatic leader is contagious in confidence, enthusiasm, and optimism despite risk (Yukl et al., 2009). In my organization, the strengths of those with charismatic leadership are increasingly utilized for unethical practices at the allowance of a followership's' adoration without question. Crisis situations and unconventional approaches charismatic leaders are noted for could be drawbacks as breaking from conformity inspires determined enemies and a classification as an outsider or other disfavor (Levay, 2010; Yukl et al., 2009). I find myself unenthused for the unethical charismatic leaders, yet hopeful of a crisis to warrant a shift in the followership. Hence, charismatic leadership is unusual and bold change from the norm engendering caution among the slower to follow individuals or groups among an organization's hierarchy. Should a secure followership emerge, drawbacks include group think and a limitation of innovation capacity beyond the identified charismatic leader (Bénabou, 2013; Yukl et al., 2009).

Last up are my experiences with charismatic leadership and what I think of this style. My experiences with charismatic leadership have been cautiously positive in the past. I have sought charismatic leaders as mentors, and until a position acquired a few years ago, found all to be worthy of their followers, adoration, high praise, and still modest (Yukl et al. 2009). As a result of the power charismatic leadership enables, most of the leaders with the "gift" practiced caution and incorporated intentional techniques to prevent drawbacks, like "groupthink" (Bénabou, 2013; Yukl et al. 2009). For instance, I have reflected deeply on the methods a charismatic leader uses in my past offices. Rather than be the host of every staff meeting, always provide ideas, and otherwise leverage his charismatic traits, the leader designates a team member to lead meetings, limits his idea offerings, and encourages conflicting arguments (i.e., brainstorming) for proposed courses of action. His practices received question and more time investment, but resulted in better solutions, richer ideas, and a stronger team with momentum behind chosen courses of action. As long as I remain ethical and as humble as those charismatic leaders I admire, and gifted with any attributes associated with charismatic leadership, I will continue to embrace the style of charismatic leadership. I agree with observers' claims of the style being a "gift" and an ability to leverage for the greater good.

In closing, I trust you have gained greater insight to charismatic leadership and your own understanding of it has expanded courtesy of my sharing from the literature and personal thoughts. Let us all be charismatic, never catty. 🕄

Kristyn E. Jones is Performing the Duties of the Under Secretary of the Air Force, the Pentagon, Arlington, Virginia. She is responsible for the affairs of the Department of the Air Force, comprised of the U.S. Air Force and U.S. Space Force, to include organizing, training, and equipping Air and Space Forces and for the welfare of approximately 700,000 active duty, Guard, Reserve and civilian Airmen and Guardians and their families serving around the world. As the Under Secretary, she oversees the department's annual budget of more than \$205 billion and directs strategy and policy development, risk management, weapons acquisition, technology investments and human resource management across a global enterprise.

Ms. Jones serves as the Senate-confirmed Assistant Secretary of the Air Force for Financial Management and Comptroller. In this role, she serves as the principal adviser to the Secretary, Chief of Staff of the Air Force and Chief of Space Operations on all financial matters. She is responsible for providing financial management and analytical services necessary for the effective and efficient use of the Department of the Air Force resources. This includes directing the development of the Air Force program and budget, overseeing the Air Force Cost Analysis Agency's acquisition and operational cost analysis, providing analytical services and conducting Air Force accounting and finance operations.

Prior to her current governmental service, Jones was a Managing Director in KPMG's Federal Advisory practice, where she supported the Department of Defense, Veterans Affairs, and other federal clients. Previously, Jones served in a variety of government positions. She entered the Senior Executive Service in June 2008 serving as Director, then Deputy Assistant Secretary of the Army for Financial Information Management until 2014. From 2007 to 2008, Jones was assigned as the Special Assistant to the Assistant Secretary of the Army, Financial Management and Comptroller for Cost Management Transformation. Prior to this role, Jones was the Director of Enterprise Transition Planning at the Department of Defense Business Transformation Agency and served as a Financial Manager at the Office of Naval Research. Earlier in her career, Jones held management positions at two Fortune 500 companies, Capital One and Advanced Micro Devices. Jones also served as a Military Intelligence Officer in the U.S. Army, where she held a variety of leadership positions.



The narrative of the application must include information in each of the areas below:

While most candidates in the CDFM program are civilian or military/reserve members of the Department of Defense, U.S. Coast Guard, U.S. Army, U.S. Air Force, U.S. Navy, U.S. Marine Corps or employees of defense contractors or suppliers, the CDFM program is open to <u>all candidates</u> who have a high school diploma (or equivalent) and meet the following work experience qualifications:

Have the required number of years of defense-related financial management experience outlined below:

- Two (2) years if you hold an Associate's degree or higher; or
- Three (3) years if you do not have a degree.

Do not have defense-related financial management experience, but can meet the following criteria outlined below:

- Four (4) years of Federal government-related financial management experience; and
- An Associate's degree or higher.

There are three steps involved with earning your CDFM:

- 1. Enroll in the CDFM Program. Your enrollment is valid for two (2) years, during which time you must take, and successfully pass, the three CDFM module examinations.
- 2. Submit Your Verification of Financial Management Experience Form. This form, which must be signed by a supervisor who can verify your work experience, must be returned to ASMC after enrolling in the CDFM program. You do not have to submit this form prior to taking a CDFM examination, but it is required prior to the awarding of the CDFM designation.
- 3. Purchase and Schedule the CDFM Examinations. Be sure to carefully and completely read the criteria associated with each testing option for the CDFM examinations. Failure to do so can result in the purchase of the wrong CDFM examination and/or the inability to test at your preferred location
